

Narrative Writing
Structure - How the writing is organized and fits together.
Tells, draws and writes a whole story.
Shows what happened first in the story.
Puts the story in order.
Show what happened last in the story.
Writes a page for the beginning, a page for the middle, and a page for the end.
Development - How the writing demonstrates depth and relevance for the reader.
Indicates who was in the story, what they did, and how the character(s) felt.
Draws and writes some details about what happened.
Language Conventions - How the writing uses English language rules.
Writes a phoneme for the sounds heard.
Uses the word wall to help spell.
Puts a space between words.
Information/Opinion Writing
Structure - How the writing is organized and fits together.
Tells, draws, and writes an opinion about a topic or book.
Writes opinion or tells the topic in the beginning.
Writes the idea and then writes more. Uses words such as because.
Writes a last part or page.
Tells opinion in one place and in another place explains why.
Development - How the writing demonstrates depth and relevance for the reader.
Includes all thoughts about the topic on the page.
Has details in pictures and words.
Language Conventions - How the writing uses English language rules.

Writes a phoneme for the sounds heard.
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Uses the word wall to help spell.

Puts a space between words.

Writing Process

Comes up with ideas to write about.

Writes 3-5 sentences during a writing session.
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Begins to add more to pictures and writing when encouraged.
